NMCEL - Then and Now

The Coalition was created in 1971, originally called the New Mexico School Administrators' Association. Early pioneers of this organization included Earl Nunn who served as the first full-time director. Mr. Nunn preserved original hand-written documents detailing the origins and first meetings of the organization.

The first constitution listed the purposes of the organization:

- 1. To unify the professional efforts of member groups in areas of common interests;
- 2. To coordinate research, publications, and legislative activity of member groups;
- 3. To provide appropriate services to member groups in areas such as insurance, retirement, and legal information; and
- 4. To work cooperatively with other organizations seeking to improve public education.

To this day, the organization lives up to the original commitments.

The New Mexico Coalition of Educational Leaders (NMCEL) Executive Board reviews and updates their strategic plan annually as needed. In July 2013, the membership voted and passed action which included rebranding and a name change. In July 2014, the membership voted and passed action to change the Vice President position to President-elect. Prior to that, NMCEL was known as the New Mexico Coalition of School Administrators. In August 2016, the Board hired Stan Rounds as Executive Director.

NMCEL Activities
